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Subject: Please DO NOT move the audit!

Wow. There are so many names I recognize on this list. I've worked with some of you on legislation years ago, and some of you I know from my mom, Cheryl Tyler, who was an assistant in both chambers before she passed in 2012. Even with term limits, some of you have held office in one capacity or another since I started getting involved over 25 years ago. Not an easy accomplishment, I'm sure.

Back to why I'm writing to you. Like most registered voters in Arizona, let alone Maricopa County, I'm concerned my vote did not count. For those of you who have fought so hard to bring TRUE transparency to our 2020 General Election, Thank you. I know who you are, and I will always be grateful to you for taking the

slings and arrows on our behalf.

Today, I join my fellow patriots in asking you NOT to move the audit. Like a lot of other voters in Maricopa County, I have no idea why some of you are not holding the line when it comes to conducting the audit at the MCTEC. That said, after extensive review of both the Senate Judiciary Committee Subpoena and the Statement of Work, I believe the minute MY BALLOT leaves the MCTEC it will no longer count. How can you move an audit out of where it was originally processed (MCTEC), violate your own Subpoena and SOW, without completely undermining the results of the audit? No one has answered that question, and/or provided any evidence to dispute this claim. If anyone has any, I would appreciate it if you would send it to me.

Like it or not, I'm trusting you to protect my vote. If there is any chance that moving the audit compromises my vote from being accurately counted, then that falls on your shoulders. The buck stops with you. As a result, I would greatly appreciate it if you would consider--then act on--the request outlined below.

We ask the Senate to exercise their full authority as confirmed by the court to do the following four things to ensure a thorough and valid forensic audit:

1. Issue a new subpoena explicitly demanding immediate access to the Maricopa County Tabulation and Election Center (MCTEC), securing all election data and its facilities under the oversight of the AZ Senate to allow the auditors to do a top down forensic audit. The Senate and the auditors will determine where the audit needs to take place and not the Maricopa County Board of Supervisors.

Suggested subpoena language for a Senate subpoena:

Recorder Stephen Richer and the Maricopa County Board of Supervisors are to turn the entire MCTEC operation over to the Senate, including its physical and electronic access, until auditors have finished a full forensic audit of the entire center. Normal operations not interfering with the audit may continue but under direction of the Senate.

1. Obtain a court order to protect all of Arizona's irregular ballots as required by statute. All irregular ballots. All 15 Counties. It is currently not protected by a court order, which is the only way to protect irregular ballots under ARS 16-624 (B).

Irregular ballots: Senators, please petition the AZ courts for an injunction against destruction of the irregular ballots, which may take place as early as May 2nd, 2021. All counties of Arizona are to be included in the injunction. Only the courts have the authority to preserve the irregular ballots, under statute ARS 16.624 (B).

1. Clarify the Statement of Work (SOW) to ensure 100% high resolution paper scanning of all ballots, envelopes, faxes for an exhaustive forensic computerized analysis with KinematicAnalysis.

2. The Senate and House are to remain in legislative session (currently set to end on 4/24/2021) until the audit is complete. Election Integrity Legislative hearings need to be held in chambers and open to the public. Additional subpoenas need to be issued for a rigorous investigation into all allegations of malfeasance in the 2020 election.

3. Finally, the Senate must audit the chain of custody first prior to accepting receipt of paper ballots and equipment from MCBOS. "Buyer beware" adage holds true here as in daily life.
